The Cross and Passion of Our Lord Are the Hour of His Glory "Behold, your King is coming to you . . . humble and mounted on a donkey" (Zech. 9:9-12; Mt. 21:1-9). Our Lord rides in this humble fashion because He is entering Jerusalem to humble Himself even to the point of death on a cross (Phil. 2:5-11). His kingly crown will not be made of gold but of thorns, the sign of sin's curse. For His royal reign is displayed in bearing this curse for His people, saving us from our enemies by sacrificing His own life. The sinless One takes the place of the sinner so that the sinner can be freed and bear the name "Barabbas," "son of the Father" (Matthew 26 and 27). It is at the name of this exalted Savior, Jesus, that we bow in humble faith. With the centurion who declared, "Truly this was the Son of God!" (Mt. 27:54), we are also given to confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father (Phil. 2:11).

Prayer Practice This Week - Rebellious Fidelity (Unceasing Prayer) In *Praying Like Monks, Living Like Fools*, Tyler Staton ends his book talking about persistence in prayer. He addresses an issue that we all experience - spiritual boredom. Here's what he writes: "Spiritual boredom isn't necessarily a sign that we're lapsing in prayer; in face, it often means we're maturing. The real fight of faith comes on all the ordinary days after the climactic moment because of what we all know but are too polite to come right out and admit: fidelity is boring." The final prayer practice I'd like to share with you is developing a prayer rhythm. As Staton says, "A daily prayer rhythm is about fidelity. It has absolutely everything to do with love and absolutely nothing to do with legalism. Jesus' personal discipline was always about freedom and life." If you have an established prayer rhythm, great! You don't need to change anything. However, you can always examine and tweak things as you desire. What Luther suggests in the catechism is solid gold. Here is another suggested rhythm from Staton's book: (1) Morning: Pray the Lord's Prayer. Start the opening moments of your day in prayer, and make use of the prayer Jesus taught us. This doesn't mean using the Lord's Prayer as a script. It means using Jesus' words to thematically move you through a personal conversation with God. This is exactly what Luther suggests in his teaching on prayer. (2) Midday: Pray for the Lost. Take a minute or two to talk to God in the midst of all your work. Use this as an opportunity to recognize that this small temporary earthly kingdom is not the ultimate one. Jesus is establishing God's rule of love and mercy here to the earth. This is the kingdom that matters. Pray that this kingdom comes to those who are still outside it. (3) **Evening: Gratitude.** Spend the evening drive home or before you go to bed reflecting on the good things of the day. Then thank God for them. Note the things you might easily overlook and the things that surprised you. Notice that when you start to think about the things God gives you each day. He has the habit of overdoing it!
